Ground-breaking dance from one of Ireland's leading choreographers in a thrilling new interpretation of Virgil's epic poem, *The Aeneid*, performed to an exhilarating electronic score in the Marina Market warehouse.

Exploring themes both timeless and contemporary including war, migration, displacement and identity through dance and movement, this bold new work from choreographer Philip Connaughton (*Party Scene, Love Songs*) offers a fresh and

engaging perspective that speaks to audiences on a deep and emotional level - inviting us to reflect on our own experiences and the world around us. A culmination of the artist's creative journey that builds on his previous works and experiences, *TROJANS* reflects the values and concerns of contemporary society and continues the artist's commitment to creating meaningful and impactful contemporary dance theatre for all audiences.

After a career-defining moment as a young dancer performing in Berlioz's opera *Les Troyens* at La Scala, twenty-five years later Connaughton returns as a choreographer to the work and to the earth-shattering themes of war, primacy of fate, the suffering of wanderers, and the glory of State in collaboration with sound designer/electronica composer Nigel Truswell, lighting designer Begoña Garcia, costume designer Emily Ní Bhroin, video designer Luca Trufarelli and a cast of exceptional Irish and international dancers.

Fantasy and reality blend in this new play about an old man, caught in the recesses of his mind as actions long buried climb to the surface.

In the silence he heard soft footsteps. A girl stands in his doorway. A sneeze, a sigh, and ... "Tell me a story." In a collapsed cottage Old Man and Little Girl spend their days eating tinned pears, telling stories, and digging holes. Old Man is reckoning with his past. His daily functioning relies on the companionship of the mysterious child, but their fragile co-existence is fractured when the weight of his past comes to bear. Exploring the personal and mental consequences of complicity, enter Old Man and Little Girl's world between reality and imagination – and see what happens when we must finally bear the weight of our actions.

BrokenCrow is a collective of six theatre artists – writers. actors, designers and directors - based in Cork, Waterford and Kilkenny who work together to create high quality original work. Since inception, they have staged fifteen productions including previous works for Cork Midsummer Festival, Dark Kingdom and Blackwater Babble. The Settling is one of two productions from BrokenCrow in this year's festival programme, alongside Found by Aideen Wylde.

London's visionary string orchestra 12 Ensemble perform Max Richter's iconic re-invention of Vivaldi's *Four Seasons* alongside his acclaimed *On the Nature of Daylight* with violinist Eloisa-Fleur Thom.

The 12 Ensemble, led by Artistic Directors Eloisa-Fleur Thom and Max Ruisi, is a pioneering un-conducted string ensemble. Modern, dynamic and virtuosic, the group has rapidly developed a reputation as one of Europe's most exhilarating collectives, moving audiences worldwide with powerful musical experiences.

The ensemble have collaborated with contemporary artists such as Max Richter, Jonny Greenwood, Nick Cave, Laura Marling, The National, Elena Tonra and choreographer Alexander Whitley. The group recorded on Jonny Greenwood's soundtrack to the films Spencer and The Power of the Dog. They have released two highly critically-acclaimed albums, Resurrection (2018) and Death and the Maiden (2020) and feature on soprano Mary Bevan's latest release Visions Illuminées (2023). The group are Artist in Residence at London's Wigmore Hall for the 23/24 season, and will be releasing their third album in Autumn 2023.

PARTICIPATING ARTISTS

ELLLL (Ellen King)

ELLLL is Cork Midsummer Festival artist in residence 2023 – 2024. An Irish multi-disciplinary composer, producer and DJ based in Berlin, writing and performing music under her own name and ELLLL moniker, Ellen has carved out a distinctive voice in both contemporary and club-music contexts. Ellen is a founding member of Ireland's first fem-electronic music collective, Gash Collective, and has advocated for diversity and visibility within the music scene through workshops and masterclasses. In addition to her work in club music, Ellen has also worked extensively as a multi-disciplinary artist with commissions and collaborations for a slew of contemporary music projects in the realms of visual arts, film, installation, dance and performance art. Most recently for Cork Midsummer Festival, she collaborated with artist Oonagh Kearney on Birdie in 2021.

Sweet&chilli___ (DJ)

Maria Pereda, better known by her Sweet&chilli___ alias specializes in spinning soulful and deep house music. Cutting her teeth in creating custom soundscapes for restaurants around Madrid and Cork, Sweet&chilli__ makes a lasting impression, embracing a wide variety of genres from mellow jazz to driving beats.

Mineral Stunting (live)

Alias of Cork's Lighght, purveyor of gulch ambient, sounds like smoke over a bog with a light shining on through.

BABY NITS (live)

BABY NITS are wingless insects that spend their entire lives on the human scalp, they feed exclusively on human blood and make art and tunes. Recent performances include Community Scratch Games Galway, Alternating Current Festival and Open Ear.

HowlBux (live)

The project of musicians and composers Elaine Howley and Irene Buckley, who create atmospheric textures with ghosted vocals and synths. Sometimes pop, sometimes improvisational and exploratory, HowlBux creates atmospheres from the serene and hypnotic to the dense and immersive.

Alan Massey (live)

Alan Massey is a sound artist and guitarist from Newcastle West in County Limerick. Exploring the intersection between digital and analogue technologies, his productions have a raw and ethereal quality. He combines stereo field recordings and found sounds to compose textural pieces that are evocative of forgotten times and landscapes.

DOSE (DJ)

DOSE is a Cork-based multi-disciplinary platform creating spaces and events for local talent, the diaspora and artists based in Ireland. The collective is a meeting of minds and messers all committed to the growth of underground art and music in the city.

A new installation by Dublin-based artist Tamsin Snow, curated by Chris Clarke and commissioned by The Glucksman.

Looking at soon-to-be obsolete machine technologies such as ATMs, photocopiers, and phone booths, incorporating CGI video animations, the installation incorporates sound, light and sculpture, and draws on Snow's research into development in miniature robotics being used in biomedical engineering, artificial intelligence, and food-waste management. *Relic* explores new ways of understanding complex scientific research and how we can think about our relationship to technological developments.

Tamsin Snow is a Dublin-based artist whose installations have been shown in solo exhibitions at Temple Bar Gallery + Studios, Dublin; Atelierfrankfurt, Frankfurt; Block 336, London; Mermaid Arts Centre, Bray; and Oonagh Young Gallery, Dublin. Her group exhibitions include shows in Dublin, Helsinki, London, New York, Stockholm, and Vienna.

Written for Barry's longstanding collaborator Einat Tuchman, this performance is rooted in a form of artistic 'barefoot anthropology', recounting the artist's tenuous interactions with the land, farming, man, and animal. Reflecting on the culture of disconnection from the natural world and the boundaries of art and the rural every day, Barry draws on her background running a successful pedigree Lleyn sheep flock alongside her art practice - and like her previous work, combining text, narrative performance and visual art to exist between the theatre and the gallery space.

Orla Barry has had solo exhibitions at MuZee, Ostend; Crawford Art Gallery, Cork; ARGOS Centre for Art and Media, Brussels; and Mother's Tankstation, Dublin and has shown at EVA international and the RHA Dublin. Her work has been performed at KAAI theatre, Brussels; Museum M, Leuven, SMAK, Gent and IMMA, also at Dublin Theatre Festival; Project Arts Centre, Dublin; South London Gallery; Tate Modern, London; De Appel, Amsterdam. She is a Lecturer at SETU and former Advising Researcher at the Jan Van Eyck Académie, Netherlands.



Jackie is the 2023 recipient of the Jane Anne Rothwell Award, presented annually in memory of the inspirational Chair of Cork Midsummer Festival from 2013 - 2018. A leading figure in Cork's legal and business community. Jane Anne was an incredible mentor to. and champion of, women in the arts. A traveling installation from artist Jackie Nevin using a giant nest to inspire conversations about home, nature, and the environment.

The installation aims to engage people in a positive and joyful conversation about the natural world, away from the fearful and towards positive associations. The blackbird's nest will travel, on a handcart, through the streets of Cork, stopping frequently to engage with the public. At the close of the festival, the nest with its eggs will be floated on the river to continue its journey to the sea.

Jackie Nevin is a sculptor, living and working in west Cork. The primary focus of her practice is to re-engage people with the natural world. By bringing large scale sculptures out of the gallery and into a public setting she invites conversation and interaction. Her work is tactile and employs materials that reflect a sustainable arts practice and a commitment to the environmental welfare. In a recent project with the library service 'Bringing Outside In', Jackie brought art into a community setting to promote positive mental health through engagement with art and nature.



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
